



Cabinet paper summary: Terms of Reference for Design and Advisory Groups



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What is this document about?



This document is an Easy Read summary of a Cabinet Paper.

A **Cabinet Paper** has information in it that **Cabinet** needs to:

- know
- make a decision about.



Cabinet is a group of people called Ministers who work in Government.

These Ministers meet to make important political decisions.



The Cabinet Paper is from Andrew Little who is the Minister for the Public Service.



The Cabinet Paper is about the **Terms of Reference** that will be used by **Design and Advisory Groups**.



Terms of Reference are the things the group work on.



The **Design and Advisory Groups** are groups of people who have been asked to make a **redress** system for people who were abused while in care.



We will explain what the word redress means on pages 9 to 12 of this document.

Changes to the Terms of Reference



The Government needs to create a redress system very quickly.



It is important that the Terms of Reference can be used well by the Design and Advisory Groups.



The Terms of Reference might need to be changed if anything new happens like:



- the amount of time we have to create the redress system changes
- the way we need to present the proposals changes.



The Cabinet Social Wellbeing

Committee is being asked to allow
the Minister for the Public service to
change the Terms if needed.



The Cabinet Social Wellbeing
Committee thinks about plans to
make sure everyone has a good
standard of living.

It is also called the **SWC**.





Standard of living means things like:

- having enough money to buy the things you need to have a good life
- having enough food to eat.



It is important that the Design and Advisory Groups are well supported so that they can:





 create a trauma-informed workspace.







A **trauma-informed workspace** is somewhere that people can work while feeling:

- safe
- listened to
- understood.



The Design and Advisory Groups will have a lot of services to support them in their work.

What is a redress system?





Redress means someone:

- agrees that something bad has happened
- does something to try to:
 - o put things right
 - make up for any harm that has been done.





Redress can be things like:

- saying sorry
- giving money as a way of saying sorry
- giving other kinds of support like counselling.



The redress system this paper is about is for people who were **abused** while **living in care**.









Being **abused** means experiencing things like:

- physical abuse such as a person kicking / hitting you
- sexual abuse such as a person doing sexual things to you that you do not want them to
- emotional abuse such as a person yelling or saying things to you that are not nice
- neglect such as a person not giving you the things / care you need.



Living in care means that the Government or a faith-based institution was in charge of your care / looking after you.



Faith-based institutions are run by religious groups like churches.



Cabinet has already said yes to making a new redress system that is:

- not part of the Government
- focused on **survivors**.



In this document we call people who have been though abuse in care survivors.



Cabinet has also said yes to some projects to make the way redress happens now better for survivors.



It is important to work out the best way for the new redress system to work.

Terms of Reference



The Cabinet Paper says what the **Terms of Reference** for the Design and Advisory Groups might be.



The Design and Advisory Groups need to say that they are happy with these Terms of Reference.



The Terms of Reference will support the Design and Advisory Groups to:



- do what they need to do
- make sure any risks are managed in a safe way.







The Terms of Reference make it so the Design and Advisory Groups can:

- have Māori as leaders
- have a lot of different ways of looking at things from different groups of survivors
- create plans for the work they will do to be:
 - o safe
 - o on time.







The Terms of Reference say:

- what the different roles in the groups are
- what each person needs to do
- how the Design and Advisory
 Groups will work
- the rules for making choices
- the rules for fixing problems.





- the Design Group will lead the work
- the Advisory Groups will support the Design Group in:
 - reaching their goals
 - telling the Design Group what survivors think of their ideas.
- the Design and Advisory Groups will follow Te Tiriti o Waitangi / The Treaty of Waitangi as part of the new redress system.









Te Tiriti o Waitangi / The Treaty of Waitangi is a document that tells us how Government and Māori will work together to:

- make decisions
- protect things that are important to Māori.

The Design Group will meet in either:





late May 2023





or

• early June 2023.





They will present their final plan in August 2023.



The Minister for the Public Service will have a **commissioning conversation** with the Design and Advisory Groups to:

- support them to start well
- make sure they know what needs to be in their plans.



A commissioning conversation is when the Minister for the Public Service talks with the Design and Advisory Groups to:

- make it clear what the work is about
- plan how to start the work.



Other Ministers can say if they would like to come to the commissioning conversation.



The **Co-chairs** will be told if any other Ministers want to come along.



A **Co-chair** is someone who works with someone else to lead the Design and Advisory Groups in making a redress system.

Cabinet Paper recommendations



Recommendations are things that the Minister for the Public Service thinks should happen.



The recommendations are from the Minister for the Public Service to the SWC.



The Minister for the Public Service recommends that SWC says yes to:

 the Terms of Reference for the Design and Advisory Groups



 the Minister for the Public Service being allowed to make any changes to the Terms of Reference if he needs to do so.





The Minister for the Public Service also recommends that SWC says yes to:

 other Ministers can ask to come to the commissioning conversation with the Design and Advisory Groups.
